Josiah (*Yahweh heals*) succeeded his idolatrous father Amon, when he was only eight years old. At the age of sixteen, Josiah began to seek after the ways of the Lord (2 Chronicles 34:3) and left those of his father, Amon, and his grandfather, Manasseh, and began to follow after David, a king after God's own heart. Josiah's reign, like that of all the good kings before is compared to David.

In the 18th year of Josiah's reign. And unexpected event took place and changed the course of his life and reign as king of Judah. A "book of the Law" was discovered while the temple was being repaired. Hilkah, the high priest, found the book gave it to Shapan, the scribe, who in turn read it to King Josiah. Upon hearing the message of the book Josiah responded by tearing his clothes, a sign of repentance, and humbled himself before the Lord. God assured Josiah that the promised destruction would not come in his time (2 Kings 22:8-20; 2 Chronicles 34: 15-28). Josiah instigated the most far-reaching religious reforms in Israel's history.
